Lung Cancer Stigma Remains an Issue


Comparing 2018 survey results to a 2008 survey showed an increased belief that lung cancer patients are viewed or treated differently than patients with other cancers:

- General patient recognition of stigma increased from **54%** to **70%**.
- The feeling that lung cancer patients are treated differently by society increased from 45% to 63%.
- The belief that loved ones would be more supportive of patients if they had a different type of cancer increased from 11% to 25%.
- From 2008 to 2018, more oncologists noted that patients blame themselves for their diagnoses (57% vs. 67%).

- **2. Drive continuous compliance** with changing standards and regulatory requirements, which can be resource-intensive and challenging to implement across multiple sites.

Things You Need to Know About the HPV and Oral Cancer Connection

- There are more adults with oral cancer from HPV than cervical cancer.
- Oral cancer from HPV can affect both women and men.
- Among newly diagnosed cases of oral cancer, the fastest-growing segment is people under age 40.
- For decades, tobacco (smoking and smokeless) was the leading cause of oral cancer. Now, HPV takes the lead, by more than 10 times the risk of smoking.
- The HPV vaccine is covered by health insurance until age 21 in boys and age 26 in girls.
- The average age of the first exposure to oral sex is now 10 to 13 years old.

Women Struggle to Understand Health Insurance Coverage

- Almost half of surveyed women (47%) say the most important factor when selecting a health plan is the cost of premiums, deductibles, out-of-pocket maximums, and co-pay costs.
 Yet, 60% find it difficult to locate plan details and understand what the plan covers.
- Less than one-third (31%) are "very confident" their insurance provides adequate coverage.
- Women rank access to primary care and regular preventive services as the most important benefit (77%), followed by prescription drug coverage (74%), emergency care and hospital services (73%), and access to specialty care physicians (67%).
- More than half of women with health insurance (54%) have experienced care delays while their physicians waited to obtain prior authorization.
- 37% of women in the U.S. have difficulty paying for their prescription medicines and the number is significantly higher for those with a chronic condition (48%) and those without health insurance (52%).
