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HCFA Expresses Interest in ACCC Drug Bulletin

ACCC was invited to meet with Robert Wren, Director of the Office of Coverage Policy at the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) to provide HCFA staff with background information on the development of its quarterly publication, the ACCC Compendia-Based Drug Bulletin.

ACCC Executive Director, Lee E. Mortenson, D.P.A., Delegate Representative, A. Collier Smyth, M.D., and Bulletin Editor, Marilyn Evans, provided Wren, as well as other Medicare and Medicaid staff at HCFA, with detailed information on why the Bulletin was created, that its content is based solely on the three authoritative drug compendia, the procedure for updating the Bulletin, and the ongoing review of the Bulletin by representatives of the three compendia.

Currently, Medicaid is required to pay for off-label drug use that is recognized by the compendia and peer-reviewed literature. However, off-label drug reimbursement for Medicare patients is left to the discretion of individual Medicare carriers.

ACCC Membership Survey Results

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Hospital/physician relations, new technology, and clinical trials are the most threatened components of today's cancer programs according to this year's survey of ACCC members (39.1%, 30.5%, and 27.6% respectively).

However, when the survey results are analyzed by type of position, a higher percentage of cancer program administrative directors and other cancer care team members (i.e., nurses, data coordinators, etc.) believe that hospital/physician relations are the greatest threat to the continued functioning of their cancer programs (44.6% and 36.6% respectively) than medical oncologists/medical directors (32.3%). Overall, oncologists/medical directors view new technology as the component of a cancer program that is most at risk (43.1%).

When asked what new program elements members are planning to implement

within the next two years, 58.8 percent of all respondents indicated marketing programs, followed by screening/prevention programs (57.7 percent), recruitment of additional medical oncologists (47.7 percent) and pain/rehabilitation programs (38.4 percent).

Regardless of position, all ACCC members responding to the survey view the following areas as major problems that their institution/practice will confront over the next three years: declining reimbursement, the advent of prospective payment for ambulatory care, hospital/physician relations, increased competition in the marketplace, and funding for clinical research. Membership also indicated that the major political or legislative issues that ACCC should tackle during the coming year are reimbursement/payment reform, access to care, and funding for clinical research.

More information on the membership survey will be available after the Strategic Planning Committee has completed its analysis of the results and formulated the ACCC's goals and objectives for the 1993-1994 fiscal year.

CRG Update

Members of the ACCC Collaborative Research Group (CRG) have been working with CIBA-GEIGY medical and clinical monitors to initiate clinical studies with Aredia™ (Pamidronate Disodium for Injection). The three studies are under way at 10 member institutions and seven patients had been enrolled at the time *Oncology Issues* went to press.

Another company has approached ACCC regarding a Phase III study in Stage IV breast cancer patients. The proposal is currently under consideration by the CRG Steering Committee.
