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OIG Report on Cost of Chemotherapy Drugs

The Inspector General of the Department of Health and Human Services issued a report, "OIG Report on Physician Costs Associated with Chemotherapy Drugs". The report is based on a survey of New York oncology practices to determine the prices paid by physicians for chemotherapy drugs. The limited survey concludes that drugs are available to physicians for less, and in some cases substantially less, than the Red Book average wholesale prices. The report includes several recommendations, including paying for drugs based on surveys of actual acquisition cost and paying for only the amount of drug actually used. The response of the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), which is included in the report, generally views the report's findings as inconclusive because of the small sample involved. The IG, however, is planning a more extensive review of drug acquisition costs.

Cancer Survivor Leadership Council Develops Health Care Reform Statement

The National Coalition of Cancer Survivorship has put together a Leadership Council which is finalizing a health care reform statement for cancer survivors. Represented on the Council: Susan G. Komen Foundation, Candlelighters Childhood Cancer Foundation, Y-Me, US Too, CancerCare and the National Alliance of Breast Cancer Organizations. The statement, which is expected to be released this month, proposes a series of recommendations as essential components of a reform package and was discussed at ACCC's Oncology Presidents' Retreat in late January (see related story on page 16).

FDA Guidelines on Educational Activities

The Food and Drug Administration has issued a "Draft Policy Statement on Industry-Supported Scientific and

Educational Activities" (Federal Register, November 1992). The guidelines outline the requirements that should be met if an educational activity receives support from a company. The FDA regulates promotional activities that apply to therapeutic and diagnostic products: human and animal drugs, biological products and medical devices.

ACCC provided comments expressing concern that the guidelines will unnecessarily restrain the free speech of scientists involved in dialogue about research questions. The Association believes that professional organizations are capable of self-monitoring citing peer review committees for presentations or research committees that report their findings.

In response to ACCC's comments, Peter Rheinstein, MD, Director, Medicine Staff, Office of Health Affairs, FDA, stated that the regulations are intended to govern sole sponsor, sole purpose meetings, rather than the multi-purpose, multi-sponsor meetings which concerned the oncology community.
