CALL FOR MULTIPLE MYELOMA PATIENTS

The National Cancer Institute is sponsoring a multicenter clinical trial to examine the use of a new agent to overcome chemotherapy resistance in multiple myeloma patients. The trial will study a new treatment in which PSC 833, a new cyclosporin D analog, plus vincristine, doxorubicin, and dexamenasone (VAD), is compared with VAD alone in the treatment of relapsing or refractory multiple myeloma. The study began accepting patients in March 1997, but is still seeking patients throughout the United States and Canada. The Eastern Cooperative Group (ECOG) is coordinating the trial, with participation by the Southwestern Oncology Group (SWOG), Cancer and Leukemia Group B (CALGB), and the National Cancer Institute of Canada's Clinical Trials Group (NCIC CTG).

"Drug resistance poses a significant obstacle in the treatment of multiple myeloma," explained William R. Friedenberg, M.D., Marshfield Cancer Center, Marshfield, Wisc., and ECOG's multiple myeloma committee co-chair. "This compound—PSC 833— which is designed to overcome MDR [multidrug resistance], could possibly offer a second chance to patients who once responded to chemotherapy, but then had to stop because their malignant tumors had become resistant to anticancer treatment. If it works in multiple myeloma, it could also work in other cancers that develop MDR."

The study is seeking 360 patients. Physicians interested in registering patients should contact the ECOG Coordinating Center at 617-632-3610. All study participants must be at least eighteen years old with a diagnosis of measurable multiple myeloma.
