- 39,460 diagnoses
- 13,570 deaths
- #44 cancer mortality rate
- #2 leading cause of death
- 31% tobacco-related

- #46 obesity
- #45 adult smoking rate
- #45 pub. health funding
- #39 mammography
- #37 Pap test
- #36 HPV vaccination

- 2022 Elections






Legislative Timeline

- Odd years "long" session
 - Jan Apr. 29
- Even years "short" session
 - Jan Mar 15
- 2023 Budget Process
 - Introduced by Gov.
 - Passed by House
 - Considered by Senate

2022 Review: Special Session

Abortion

- Near-total ban (exceptions for rape, incest, life/health of mother)
- Effective 9/15
- Fertility preservation/IVF is exempted
- Cancer care during pregnancy?

Wrap-around services

- Post-partum Medicaid expanded (via state law) to 12 mos. Post-delivery
- \$45 million for Nurse Family Partnership, Safety PIN grants, childcare grants



2022 Policy in Review

ACS CAN PRIORITIES:

- Colorectal Cancer Screening (HEA 1238) Requires health plans to cover colonoscopies, including follow up colonoscopies after a stool-based test, without cost-sharing
- Tobacco Control (SEA 382) Reduced tax on certain e-cigarette products; maintained exemption for synthetics
- COVID Protocols (HEA 1001) Most employers required to provide exemptions from COVID vaccine mandates; health care facilities exempt

2022 Review: Regular Session

BILLS THAT PASSED:

- Telehealth (SEA 284) added certain occupational and mental health providers; Permits Medicaid to reimburse for telehealth services from home health agencies
- Interstate medical licensure compact (SEA 251) Enters Indiana into 34-state compact; providers complete just one application
- Practitioner advertising (SEA 239) Specifies advertisements communicated by a practitioner may not include deceptive information



2022 Review: Regular Session

BILLS THAT PASSED:

- Nursing Programs (HEA 1003) various changes to address nursing shortage; continues COVID-19 temporary health care registry; flexibility for teaching associate degree programs; more pathways for foreign-educated nurses; permits growth of nursing degree programs
- Postpartum Medicaid Coverage (HEA 1140) permits
 Medicaid to extend coverage up to 12 months after birth



2022 Review: Regular Session

OTHER ISSUES OF NOTE:

- Health Care Costs A letter from legislative leaders; action is likely
- Prior Authorization/Gold Card (SB 249) Amended response timelines; created "gold card" program

- Hospitals, insurers, practitioners, PBMs, pharmaceutical, etc.

Marijuana

• Study THC products – health benefits, risks, decriminalization

Prior Authorization/Gold Card

ACS CANS PRIORITIES:

- Tobacco
 - Raising Indiana's cigarette tax; investing more in tobacco prevention & cessation programs
- Research Funding
 - Establishing a cancer research fund in Indiana to support research at IU and Purdue
- Biomarker Testing
 - Educating policymakers and stakeholders
